Bottleworks Annual Update

Gavin Thomas: Hendrix Commercial Properties 350 Mass Ave. 12 acres most of that is Phase 1, and the center core what we are now working on is Phase 2. Last year we started Building 13. You can see from the photos of the progress from last year until now. Construction will continue through 2023 and tenants will take ownership on next year. We are hoping to be 100% leased by the time we open. We had started the next part of phase 2, the second part of phase 2 is buildings 9-12. Office space on the upper floors and residential on the ground floors. The garage expansion will double the parking capacity which is part of this phase which will be from 250 to 500 spaces. The crane will move from the north over to 9th street. There will be hole digging for the next couple of months. Timing for buildings 9-12 will be a couple of years with all of Phase 2 open in May 2025. The other thing I wanted to mention is that we are working on public art. We had art in our COA, one called for art in front of the hotel. We would like to propose that the art be placed in the location pictured due to the fact that we do not think it would be ok to put art in front of art and this would be a more prominent location. We have selected all local artists. This is something we can work with staff on determining what is appropriate. We are keeping in mind that this is a busy corner. I just wanted to put that out there that these are things we are working on as far as art goes. We are happy with the progress; everything has been moving on schedule. We were approached by Indiana Landmarks wanting to put a West Montgomery monument there. I can answer any questions.

SW: Just a couple of comments and a question. The art projects are terrific. Our humanities council is really involved with murals, so you might want to touch base with them to help be in sync with the rest of the city.

GT: Yes, we have reached out to both of those groups.

SW: My question is that property across 10th street and we saw images of the proposed parking lot. That has not taken place. You all have done such a fine job everywhere else and to have that blighted area is not ok. I think it is incumbent for you guys to do something there. I think it would be helpful to your employees to be able to park there rather than in the neighborhood.

GT: We took a pause on it due to working with DOT and site logistics. We do want to use that parking space, as soon as we can get the logistics figured out then we will have a parking lot. It is still in the pipeline.

AL: Thank you for the update it looks great. It is not only just the parking lot across 10th. It just looks crappy and is not being kept up well while you are going through this process. We see a large number of construction people parking in the neighborhood and walking to Bottleworks. It has become a substantial frustration to the neighborhood of people trying to find parking.

GT: I appreciate that you live in the neighborhood, and it is helpful to hear your comments. We will work with our maintenance crew to make sure that area is cleaned up.

Matt Knolley: 918 Fort Wayne Ave. I want to speak about the Indy go super stops. A new apartment building was approved through this commission. Biggest concern is the overall sighting as it relates to the intersections if this super stop is built right in front of this building as they suggest cars will have visibility issues getting into traffic. So, the concern is cars backing up to that intersection coming into the super stop which is already challenging to come into. There is no crosswalk there so this proposes an issue for pedestrians as well. A block away seems to be a more appropriate place.

MD: Indygo has a really difficult time accessing bus stops for ADA access. The reason for the bump out is because buses have challenges with lowering the bus to help ADA riders. The second issue was not brought up, the location is taking the place of existing parked cars. So, it will not affect the site line for traffic. The other thing I heard was the pedestrian crossing, we are installing flashing lights for the pedestrian crossing. The last question was to consider alternative locations. It is a high rider stop; it is a demand for it where it is.

EJ: Staff is recommending approval of the application. There are 2 locations, all of the amenities are similar to the one the commission previously approved and it will not impact any historic buildings.

BC: I am still concerned about comments remonstrating. The city is not particularly

safe for pedestrians as a whole. I am curious to know if the county resolutions will help to assist with pedestrian safety at this location. Was there any engagement with the community groups about this project and if so, how did it go?

MD: As far as public outreach, we have not hosted any public meetings, but we have reached out to the neighborhood and provided open door for anyone to reach out If they needed to.

BC: I am curious of how the remonstrate became aware to attend the hearing. Is this the first time you have shared these concerns.

MK: I have heard rumblings of this. The reason I knew of this happening is because I got notice of the hearing today.

Mark Demerly: 6500 Westfield Blvd. There is also not a proper code landing at the door. They have never had an accident, but we are trying to prevent an accident. So, we are providing a handicap accessible ramp at the front and moving the stairway out for safety and accessibility. Applicant displays dimensions of new ADA ramp proposal. We have incorporated things to protect the existing historic structure. Staff was concerned with it reading too heavy and provided suggestions to use. I think staff is recommending approval for the ramp itself but are looking for suggestions from commission.

EJ: Staff is recommending a COAuthorization in this case, that would be due to hardships because there is no other place to put the ramp. Someone could come in in the future and remove that ramp if they decided to. Staff does and has considered that we try to make ramps as open as possible. I can answer any questions.

DB: I have no problem with the COA and approving it. Regarding the railing style, I can see where something so heavy could be inappropriate. It is very thin and dark, those two things to me make it not so intrusive. I like the artistic look of it. On this building I think it works.

JASON WOLFE

Demolish historic porte cochere, enclosed rear porch, uncovered patio, non-historic sheds, driveway and curb cuts.

Jason Wolfe: 1617 Cornell Ave. The porte cochere was built sometime between 1915 and 1937. We do not know exactly. The main issue that we have is that because it sits where it does you have to have a driveway. So not only does it make it unusable so from a practicality side it does provide the access people need. There is not many details that match with the original house. The porte cochere is sided which you do not typically see for this type of structure. There are also issues with how it was built it has caused considerate water damage and the owner has found evidence of work being done in the past to repair the water damage. We asked the neighborhood if this was a reasonable thing to do. We do have letters of support from nearby residents. One item that the neighborhood brought out is

that this could possibly set a precedence that other homeowners may want to add one to their home as well. I am ready for comments.

Christopher Harold: 1840 N Talbott St. I am representing the land use committee. At first I want to note that I am speaking for the chair who is out of town. As well as the letter that we supplied of remonstrance. We were a bit surprised that it was something that would be deemed appropriate. I went to the site there is no denying that this is a significant portion of the home. (Reads letter) We feel that this is a historic feature. I just want to highlight those 2 points from the neighborhood plan. The porte cochere does distinguish it from other homes. Next, I wanted to also mention that there are very few of these in the neighborhood that is why we are opposed to demolishing this. That may be pertinent as you review the matter further. Essentially you cannot deny the significance. We have no problem with the bins or reconfiguring the driveway site.

Joseph Brunson: 2038 N Alabama which is the house directly to the north of the property in question. I think this is one of the more unique homes in HMP. I think it would be such a shame to remove this structure and it is very unique. I think it is important to preserve these historic features of these homes.

SL: The design of these features isn't as integrated to the design as we have seen on other structures. Staff is recommending approval of a COA. We have included a stipulation in the event the owner decides not to move forward with this new construction that the structure is not removed.

DB: I can remember many years ago standing in front of this house with previous owner talking about how unusual this property was. I explained to him then that I would not support that. We talked about how houses like that change over time. I listened to the applicant's testimony, and I am not convinced. I do not think they have met the criteria for a COAuthorization.

AS: By taking out the driveway you are essentially taking away access to the garage. How do you plan to address that?

JW: That will be part of a future app. We are not sure if we will need a new garage or adjust.

WB: I may be in the same place that David is with this. There was a house in the past they started demolishing a porte cochere without approval, but we were able to save it. I do not think this should go away and have a new house built there. I am going to be a no vote.

JW: Likely denial of this means that the house will not be restored to the best ability because this presents a financial issue.

WB: Just so you know you have the option to continue or accept the vote. You only need 5 votes to approve.

There were raised window surrounds and brick that have been changed, and they have shared the proposed color pattern. Staff has 2 recommendations or two options. 1 is approval of the current design proposal changes and the 2nd if we need to continue it further to make additional changes.

AK: I had noticed a comment earlier concerning the brick color. It looks like it could be a paint or surface finish. Can you tell me if the brick color is a through color or if it was surface color?

MC: I feel like the preference was the grey color, so the owner wanted to press that. I do not have an issue for either one. The owner wanted to fight for the grey. AK: I just want to understand the method of coloring. I know that that color is not easy to achieve so I want to make sure that it is a through color and not a surface finish.

SW: I am struggling a bit. If the commission wanted red and his architect wanted gray. So is it supposed to be gray and never mind on what the commission says? **SL**: It was recommended by one commissioner that it be the red brick which is more complimentary, and it was recommended to do a grey mortar.

DB: I made the comment and there was some concern about the brick color. It was also questioned if brick itself would be appropriate. I know there are brick buildings in the area. I am not sure if I would be opposed to this but not seeing the brick, I am not sure what it is. Can we approve it and then see the brick?

WB: Yes, we can bring the brick sample back under old business and approve it tonight.

BC: Just one other comment, I thought there were concerns about the window alignment.

BACKGROUND OF PROPERTY

The subject property is the location of the 1893, 2.5-story, frame, late-Victorian, Morrell-Knode House. The Old Northside Historic Area Preservation Plan says the following regarding the house:

The hipped roof and dormer and Tuscan porch columns show Free Classic influence while asymmetrical arrangement of openings and curved bays are Queen-Anne features. This large home was erected for Lewis H. Morrell. He lived only briefly at this address and little is known of him except that he was employed by the Central Union Telephone Company.

The subsequent owner, Henry C. Knode, owned H.C. Knobe & Co., a wholesale wine and liquor business. His wife, Martha, was a noted horsewoman who took several prizes at local fairs. The Knode family retained the house in the 1950's.

The house retains many historic elements, including: historic, wood, lap siding; wood, double-hung windows (including curved windows in a southern, 2-story, bay on the front (east) elevation; decorative wood doors; a tall, decorative, red-brick chimney on the south elevation; and decorative corbels along the underside of the boxed eaves that contain original built-in gutters.

The applicant is also working with the IHPC staff on a "Part A" of this case. Part A includes work that does not require Commission review and can be reviewed and approved by Staff or the Hearing Officer at the Staff or Administrative Hearing level. This work includes, but is not limited to: repair/replacing deteriorated wood trim, siding and soffits – where needed, with new to match; replacing the existing asphalt shingle roof with a new asphalt shingle roof; restoration of historic windows and doors; replace non-historic windows; replace deteriorated ceiling and flooring of front porch like for like; repainting the house in a new color scheme; tuckpointing; structural repairs to cantilevered stair landing bump-out on south side; installation of new exterior lighting; installation of rear patio; installation of additional privacy fencing/gates; replacement of existing sidewalks and steps; and the installation of a new front walk.

REQUEST

The applicant is requesting to enclose a rear porch; rebuild an historic porch on south elevation and create a deck extension; alter openings; and repair 2nd-story rear porch and install a balustrade.

Enclose Rear Porch

There is a small, 1-story, covered, open porch on the south half of a rear (west) wing that projects off the rear (west) elevation. Its two exterior walls currently feature beadboard knee walls with grid-pattern lattice work above and a grid-pattern, lattice-work door. The proposal is to extend the beadboard-covered walls up to enclose the porch to create a mudroom on the interior. A new, double-hung, wood window will be placed on the west elevation, and a new, half-lite door will replace the existing lattice door.

Rebuild Historic Porch and Create Deck Extension

There is a small, 1-story, shed-roof porch, tucked into a southwest corner, toward the rear of the south elevation. The applicant is proposing to rebuild only the structural porch floor framing and stairs with a new wood floor and stairs. The existing brick foundation pier, support column and roof will all remain with no changes. The porch ceiling will be replaced to match. A new, uncovered, wood deck will then be constructed on the west end of the porch. The new deck will extend to the west, to the end of the enclosed porch, where steps will lead down to the backyard. Due to the height of the historic porch and new deck, a new, wood, balustrade will be installed. The balustrade will start at the stairs of the historic porch, on the very eastern end, and run the entire length of the new deck.

Opening Alterations

As part of the porch/deck extension, a basement door toward the rear of the south elevation will be removed to accommodate the new deck.

An existing, double-hung, kitchen window on the rear (west) elevation will be removed, and the opening will be enlarged to fit three, new, wood, double-hung windows, as part of a kitchen remodel.

Second-Story Porch Balustrade

There is an existing, covered, second-story porch located on top of the rear, 1-story wing. There are currently no protective railings and guards. The proposal is to install a new, wood balustrade around this area that will match the design of the new wood balustrade below on the deck and historic porch. The porch ceiling will be replaced to match. The floor decking will be replaced as well.

HISTORIC AREA PLAN RECOMMENDATION

The <u>Old Northside Historic Area Preservation Plan</u> offers the following recommendations regarding additions and porches:

• Consider: Developing a contemporary design compatible with the character and mood of the building or neighborhood.

- Avoid: Designing new additions with are incompatible with the earlier building and the neighborhood in materials, size, scale and texture.
- Consider:
 - Retaining porches and steps which are appropriate to the building and its development.
 Porches and additions reflecting later architectural styles are often import to the building's historical integrity and, where possible, should be retained.
 - Repairing or replacing, where necessary, deteriorated architectural features of wood, iron, case iron, terra-cotta, tile and brick.
- Avoid:
 - Removing or altering porches and steps which are appropriate to a building and its development and the style it represents.
 - Stripping porches and steps of original material and architectural features, such as handrails, balustrades, columns, brackets, and roof decorations of wood, iron, terracotta, cast iron, tile and brick.
 - o Enclosing porches and steps in a manner that destroys their intended appearance.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Staff is recommending approval for the requests. Staff believes the proposals are appropriate and meet the intent of the <u>Plan</u> in the following ways:

- The design of the porch enclosure and new porch elements are compatible in materials, scale and mass with the existing.
- The new siding of the enclosed porch will be beadboard, which matches the existing knee wall of the open porch.
- The existing historic band board on top of the historic brick foundation will remain and not be removed when the rear porch is enclosed.
- The existing porch trim will remain as evidence that the southwest portion of the rear elevation of the house was once an open porch.
- All of the proposed work is located behind the main body of the house and is not easily visible from the street or not visible at all from the street.
- The design and materials relate well to the overall historic nature of the existing house and the context of the Old Northside Historic District.

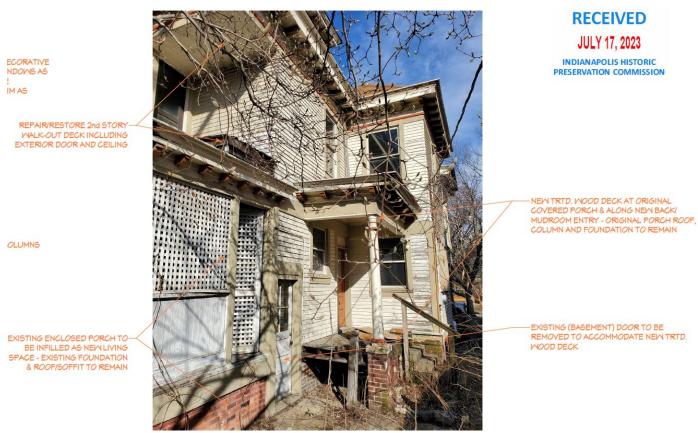

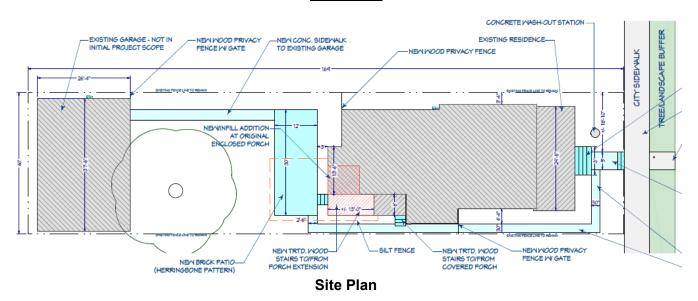

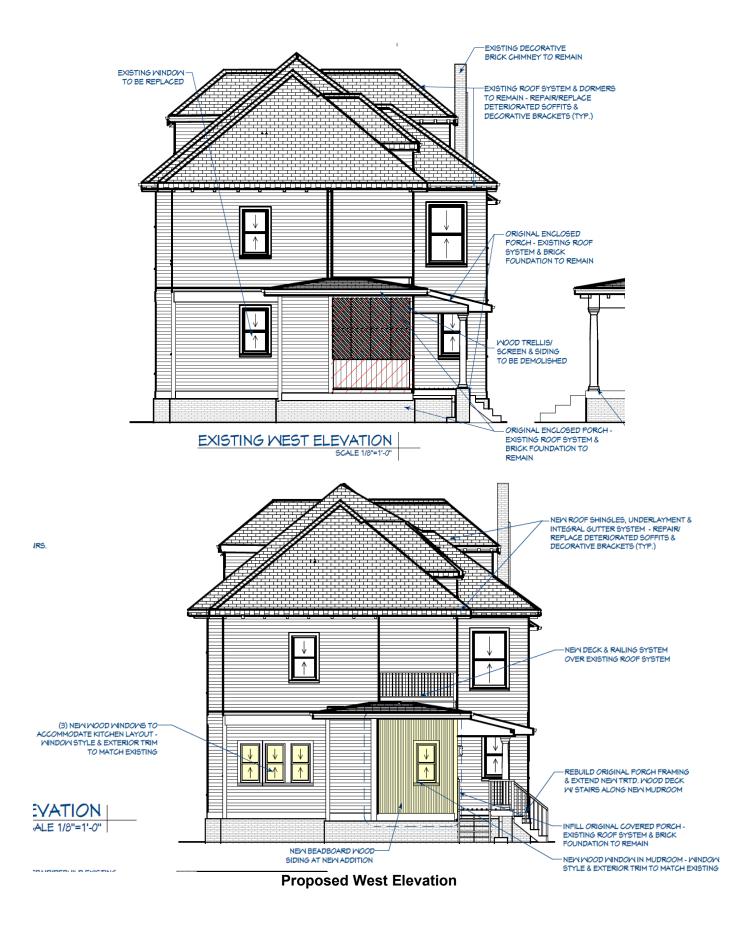
