I'm wondering why there's even a meeting and discussion on the story the Franklin Twshp Civic League posted. I can't make the meeting since it just became known a meeting was scheduled. However as shown in the attached the business was dissolved in 2024 and no other active business is showing in Indiana. No variance and this project should be denied.

Did you know that Indianapolis has a wetland filled with wildlife and even some endangered species?

It's near Pleasant Run Creek on the southside. Robin Heldman lives nearby and she told us about a time when there was a rare duck migrating through the area.

"It wasn't even from the United States, but it came during migration and we had hundreds of people lining up with their binoculars and their scopes to see it," Heldman said. "So it's pretty amazing."

That wetland was part of 10 acres purchased last year by Punjab Property Inc. The business wants to build a semi-truck repair shop on the land.

The company didn't realize that the land's zoning doesn't allow this, or that the area is some of the state's last remaining wetlands, according to Patrick Rooney, an Indiana attorney representing the company.

Punjab Property Inc. filed a petition earlier this year with the city's zoning board to modify land regulations but southsiders have been pushing back.

"I'm trying to come up with a plan that the neighbors would accept, and the city," Rooney said.

Rooney said Punjab Property Inc. intends to adjust its initial plans to include a parking lot for roughly 100 trucks and trailers, and instead preserve roughly nine acres of the property.

The Metropolitan Development Commission's hearing examiner is scheduled to hear the proposal at its 1 p.m. meeting May 28 at the City-County Building, 200 E. Washington St. The proposal, though, may be continued to June.
